About The Bartlett Tower Society

Dartmouth established the Bartlett Tower Society in 1990 to recognize members of our community who have remembered Dartmouth in their estate plans. The society is named for Bartlett Tower, the 71-foot-tall symbol of strength and stability overlooking the Bema in College Park. The tower honors Samuel Colcord Bartlett, Class of 1836, who served as Dartmouth’s eighth president, from 1877 to 1892. President Bartlett elevated fundraising as an institutional priority—he secured more than \$700,000 through lifetime gifts and realized bequests—and he was instrumental in the development of College Park.

Socrates Peter Pappas '58 has fond memories of his undergraduate years: being active in the Dartmouth Outing Club, learning to ski and play squash, and attending readings by Robert Frost.

So when he started thinking about how he could use his estate to benefit an institution that had been meaningful in life while also providing support to his loved ones, Dartmouth came to mind. In addition to all that campus life offered, the College had provided Pappas with a full scholarship, putting him on the path toward a successful career in academia and industry.

Pappas connected with the Dartmouth Gift Planning Office and decided to establish multiple charitable remainder unitrusts, which offer tax advantages while providing a steady stream of income to his loved ones.

“When it came time to consider what to do with my estate,” he says, “it didn’t take long for me to think about Dartmouth because I have such warm feelings for the College.”

The late **Harvey R. Grable ’58**, an orthopedic surgeon and former major in the United States Air Force, credited Dartmouth as a defining force in his life—and ultimately chose to give back in a meaningful way.

Grable left his entire estate—valued at approximately \$24 million—to the College, with a portion of it earmarked to establish the **Harvey R. Grable ’58 Distinguished Professorship**, supporting a faculty member whose work relates to Judaic studies.

Though he remained largely “under the radar” as a donor during his lifetime, Grable had long planned this final gift. Without a living spouse or children, he saw Dartmouth as the natural home for his legacy.

“Dartmouth was an important part of my life,” he once said. “There was something about Dartmouth that was like an older brother or a very benevolent uncle. It always felt like home.”

After sharing his plans with the College, Grable made a long-awaited return to campus—his first visit in six decades. The trip, hosted by President **Philip J. Hanlon ’77** and others, reconnected Grable with a place that had meant so much to him. Not long after, he passed away on November 2, 2022.

Through his extraordinary generosity, Grable’s connection to Dartmouth will continue to shape the College for generations to come.
